We Are People of Persistence - Keep on Pumping!

Speech given at 2010 Ruritan National Convention Installation Banquet in Virginia Beach, VA.

Thank you, for your confidence in letting me serve you in the coming year. If this were Facebook, I would click on "confirm" – you are all friends!

I would like to recognize a few people who have



put up with me for a long time. First my best friend Marsha, my wife for 37 years, and my family. Next the Smoot Ruritan Club members present tonight. I am honored that you are here. Thank you, President Donald. It has been a pleasant experience serving as your Vice President.

Then I would like to thank all of you for making our convention a

pleasant experience.

We are at the beginning of the year – what a great time for starting out on a new journey wherever you want to go.

When we board an airplane headed out for some far away city and the pilot encounters severe thunderstorms ahead – even though he has filed a flight plan -- chances are the decision will be made to take a new course either over or around the weather. Notice the decision to *go back* is the last option not the first. So like any adventure expect a few obstacles along the way.

To help me make a couple of points I brought with me a visual aide. Some of you won't need an explanation of what this is. Maybe you grew up with one.

One of my first experiences with the pump came during my first big paying job. I was in the fifth grade in 1961 and got the job as the janitor

Many years later, about 1977, in Columbus, OH I saw motivational speaker Zig Ziglar use a pump to perform a task that didn't involve pumping water.

I related to that and to Zig because he was a cookware salesman and I had been down that road too.

Those of you with experience with this kind of a pump know that it just doesn't immediately give you the water you're looking for.

Step one: you have to put something into it to get something out. So take a little water and start pouring it in. Now start working that handle.

If you are persistent the water will start to flow. Mission accomplished.

Now if everything is in perfect shape the handle will stay down and the next time you decide to exert a little energy you'll get the same results.

Well you and I both know things are seldom perfect. So what will likely happen when you let go of the handle it will slowly start to rise and when it has reached the top of the stroke there will be an ugly sucking sound – you have lost your prime.

Perhaps when it comes to starting new Ruritan clubs we have kind of lost our prime.

But what I'm trying to tell you is you have to "Keep On Pumping." I know that gets a little tiring so don't be afraid to ask for a little help to keep the production going.

But to keep the production going you first have to start. So when do you start? Well, of course, now wouldn't be a good time because it's so cold and people just wouldn't listen. Right after Easter would be better but people are all involved in the holiday. Might be better right after school lets out for summer. But then everybody is going on vacation and there's the 4th of July and all. Probably would be better right after school starts back again. But then the kids are all selling stuff to raise money for school.

October would really be good but then football is in full force. Probably should wait until that kind of finishes. Then again here comes Thanksgiving and people are really busy with that. Then of course Christmas it's the same way.

I know right after the first of the new year would be great. What do you know? That's now!


We had a great year in 2009. We were able to make significant progress in our information systems and thousands of you are using the system now. Our intent is to take what is already a great member management system and make it even better. We have already reviewed a list of enhancements for the MMS and the committee will be prioritizing that list shortly. There are few limits to what we can do with technology. Don't worry ... if you aren't a techie we will still strive to give you the very best service we can with a format that is comfortable for you.

We were also able to make significant progress in capital replacements at the national office. Our office is operating as a more energy efficient building just in time for all the snow we've seen here in Southwest Virginia! The Capital Replacement Committee is working to prioritize the next round of improvements to make the building more efficient and bring us into compliance with access laws.

Growth and Development News

2010 Growth Programs Offer Rewards

2010 National President Jerome Rodes introduced a number of new growth programs at the 2010 National Convention in Virginia Beach as well as his slogan: People of Persistence Keep On Pumping, illustrated with an old-fashioned water pump (pictured). The programs include:

Growth Program: Make a Record and Break a Record

Ruritan members aren't salesmen by definition, however we are selling people and communities on an involvement that will benefit them greatly. There is much to be said about helping people to help themselves.

So let's set a day to do just that. How about March 31, 2010 for our "Make a Record Day"? The day will begin at 12:00 a.m. and go for 24 hours.

And then to break the record we have set we will do that on September 30, 2010.

Yes, there will be recognition and rewards for those who excel. Our member who recruits the most members on either of these two days will receive a gift certificate from **StubHub** in the amount of \$500. The certificate can be used for tickets to college and professional sporting events, as well as NASCAR races or concert tickets across the nation. You don't have to use it all at one time and it doesn't expire.

The district with the most new members recruited on either of these two days will have a ribbon to wear on their name badges at the convention in Knoxville to indicate they were the leaders in the "Make a Record" or "Break a Record" days. These two winning districts will also have up-front seating at the business sessions at the 2011 Knoxville Ruritan Convention.



Growth Program: Power of Persistence Pin

In 2010 a new award will be introduced: "Power of Persistence Pin". The **POP 2010** pin will be available to any Ruritan member recruiting two new members into an adult club in 2010. Physically it is made to be worn as a bar attached to the "Presidents Golden Key" award.

If the member has a numbered bar for # of members recruited (5, 10, 65, etc) the pin will mount between the key and # of members recruited bar. If the member doesn't already have a President's Golden Key, two members in 2010 will qualify that member for both pins simultaneously. To receive the award the member must remit to Ruritan the information of the new members recruited that are used to qualify for the award.

Growth Program: Top Recruiter Award

During 2010 we will have many Ruritans who go above and beyond what is expected of the average member. There will be one that will stand out even in that group. This person will bring into Ruritan more members than any other member. We want this individual to be our guest at the National Convention in Knoxville, Tennessee. Our "Top Recruiter" will be treated to three nights lodging, free registration, and admission to any special meals they would care to attend.

Rules to choose the "Top Recruiter"

- Members must be recruited into an adult Ruritan Club.
- Members recruited may be regular, associate, youth, or dues paying honorary.
- Time period: 01/01/2010 thru 12/31/2010

In case of a tie, the winner will be the recruiter who has the new members with the greatest number of months of membership in 2010.

Growth Program: Power of Presentation Pin

New in 2010 is the "Power of Presentation Pin". The pin will be awarded to any Ruritan member who makes a presentation to a least five (5) people -- explaining the opportunity available to them if they start a new Ruritan Club. The time period is any time during 2010. The award may be made to the recipient by the District or Zone Governor anytime after it is earned. Special presentation flip charts are available from Ruritan Supply to help with your presentations. You may request one by calling toll free 877-787-8727.

All recipients will also be recognized at the 2011 National Convention.

Delegates Approve Five Bylaws Amendments

At the 2010 Ruritan National Convention five amendments to the Ruritan National Bylaws were approved by the delegates. The changes are outlined below with the actual wording of the amended sections of the bylaws.

Bylaws amendment #1 changed the voting procedure at the National Convention – allowing officers, directors and trustees to be elected with a plurality of the vote, rather than a majority of the vote on the first ballot only.

Section C: The election shall be held during the National Convention by ballot vote using paper ballots or voting machines. The official program of the convention shall indicate the day and hours of election. Each certified delegate shall have one vote for each office to be filled. Election of Officers, Directors and Foundation Trustees shall require a plurality vote.

Bylaws amendment #2 clarified the process for amending the Bylaws.

Article XIX: Amendments to these bylaws shall be made only at the National Convention of Ruritan National by a two-thirds (2/3) vote of the delegates present and voting, provided that the proposed

amendments shall have either:

a) been first presented to and approved by the Board of Directors. Notice of any proposed amendment submitted by the Board of Directors shall be published in the Ruritan Magazine at least thirty (30) days before the opening of the convention or

b) shall be submitted by a delegate at the National Convention provided any proposed amendment shall have first been reviewed by the Convention Bylaws Committee.

Bylaws amendment #3 and #4 amended article XVI, section C and allows lieutenant zone governors and district chaplains in the districts that have them, to be voting members of their district cabinets.

Section C. Each District shall be governed by a District Cabinet of which the District

Governor shall be the chair. It shall be composed of the following voting members: District Governor, Lt. Governor, assigned National Director, District Secretary, District Treasurer or District Secretary-Treasurer, all Zone Governors, all Lt. Zone Governors, the three immediate Past District Governors, District Leadership Development

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Ruritans Generously Support Charities

If the totals celebrated at the 2010 Ruritan National Convention are any indication – Ruritan Clubs spent 2009 making generous donations in their communities.

Clubs were urged to give donations of cash and food to their local food banks and to present Rudy Bears to emergency and medical personnel all year. Added in 2009 was a plea by 2009 National President Donald Worrell for clubs to sponsor American Red Cross blood drives – giving the gift of life.

The total numbers on these three projects, as presented at the Fellowship Luncheon with First Lady Roseland in Virginia Beach

were impressive. Publicity and Public Relations Chair Corky Camin told the attendees that 1841 Rudy Bears had been donated in communities across Ruritanland. In addition 298,261 pounds of food had been given to food banks by the Ruritan clubs in their communities. Ruritans were also responsible for blood donations totaling 4,620 pints.

Items of Interest

1968 National President, Executive **Secretary Charles Allen Passes**

1968 Ruritan National President and former Executive Secretary Charles Allen, Jr. died on August 25. Charles and his wife Mildred (Fullen) celebrated their 70th wedding anniversary in August He was 92 years old. The Allens had three sons: James T. Allen, Robert B. Allen, and Charles Larry Allen.

Charles was the second President of Ruritan National from West Virginia. He served as Zone Governor and Governor of the Lower West Virginia District as well as a three-year term on the National Board of

> Directors (1964-1967). He was elected Vice President at the Cleveland Convention (1967) and President at Virginia Beach (1968).

Charles was a graduate of Marshall University and West Virginia University and, for over 35 years, had served as teacher, coach, principal and superintendent when he retired. During this time he was also a part time farmer.

It was during his term as National President that "Project 3" was concluded with three more new states: Wisconsin, Michigan and New York, added to the roll, and the note for indebtedness incurred in construction of the national office building was paid off and the note burned at the Jekyll Island Convention.

He was a member of the United Methodist Church and had served as Church Trustee, District Lay Leader, church school teacher and was a member of the State, Town and Country Commission. He likewise has membership in the Chamber of Commerce, Masonic Lodge, Farm Bureau, Volunteer Fire Department, and holds a life membership in the National Education Association. Charles joined the Ruritan National Office Staff in 1974 as Assistant Executive Secretary and then Executive Secretary from 1979 until 1983.

In lieu of flowers the family requested that gifts be made to either the Trinity United Methodist Church in Union, WV or to the Charles Allen Educational Fund of the Ruritan National Foundation.



Board Approves Proposed Bylaw Amendment

At the January 2010 meeting of the Ruritan National Board of Directors approved a motion to amend Article XVI Section G of the Bylaws of Ruritan National by adding the following: "however, should the district It.



Question: Why does my Ruritan pin have the words RUS URBS? **Answer:** The phrase is Latin for rural and town – it actually translates to "country city". The phrase was used at the time Ruritan was founded when the organization was serving as a bridge between rural residents and the small towns that dotted the country side.

The Ruritan history book **The Saga**, in a chapter about the organizational meeting on May 21, 1928, notes: It was at this meeting that Rev. W. C. Hook, Chairman of the Naming Committee, reported that his committee recommend the name "Ruritan." It was immediately adopted by unanimous vote. The word is said to be a combination of the Latin words for open country (ruri) and small town (tan) interpreted as "pertaining to rural and small town life." This name had been suggested by Miss Daisy Nurney, reporter for Nansemond County to the Norfolk **Virginia-Pilot** newspaper. (Miss Nurney in 1947 stated that Ruritan means: rural dweller).

Ruritan trivia: The toll free number of the National Office is 877-RUS-URBS.

governor be unwilling to accept the position of district governor, a special meeting of the district cabinet shall be held for the purpose of filling the unexpired term."

The motion was brought by the Bylaws Committee to address concerns when a Lt. Governor chooses not to become district governor and the district finds itself without leadership. This amendment requires approval by delegates at the 2011 Ruritan National Convention.

In other action the board approved a number of growth programs presented by 2009 National Vice President Jerome Rodes. VP Jerome also asked the Advancement Committee to consider a renewed emphasis on mentoring new Ruritan members.

Ruri-Teen Rises Above Adversity and Shines

Even though she has lived with her grandmother since she was six weeks old, Niki Liner knew of no existence without her parents until they both passed away as a result of drugs and alcohol when she was in the fifth grade at Oak Grove Elementary. Only two months separated their deaths. She acknowledges the loss as an emotional upheaval causing her great sorrow, but she is determined to overcome the heartbreak, remain drug and alcohol free, and educate others on the dangers of drugs and alcohol. "Losing someone you love is the hardest thing I've had to go through, especially losing them the way I did," Liner said.

Even though alcohol disease runs in her family, she has decided it stops with her.

"I know I have a choice," she said. Liner said young people do not realize how dumb and how dangerous illegal substances can be. "When I hear classmates talk about the drugs they do, I speak up and tell them why they shouldn't have anything to do with them."

Overcoming obstacles is a journey the Bradley Central High School teen has been forced to face but chooses to persevere and find ways to reach her goals.

She used her philosophy, "no matter how big your dream is or how many people say you can't achieve it — you can with focus and hard work," when she traded her ballet shoes for a football helmet.

As the first female in Cleveland/Bradley County to play football for a middle school, she set the standard high by filling the position of middle linebacker for Lake Forest Middle School.

"Once I decided to tryout for the team, I told my family, who really didn't think I would make it," said Liner. "Even though my friend backed out on trying out with me, I decided I wanted to be the first girl to prove all the guys, coaches, teachers and everyone else wrong."

It was a challenge she took on full force.

"Many of my teachers supported me but some of my teachers expected me to come to class with ice pack or crutches, but I knew if I showed any weakness it would look bad," Liner said. "Sure, I was hurting but I didn't tell anyone."

After being diagnosed with a severe head concussion, she didn't expect to react with tears

when her doctor told her she couldn't play for the rest of the year.

Being forced to step down from the team, Liner

devoted more time to her first love dancing and she auditioned for the show choir, Revolution. She stepped up her dancing by getting involved with Cleveland City Ballet.

Recently she competed in the Miss Teen American in Nashville which began with an open call interview. In addition to the interview she was required to present a complete resume on her affiliations, school and community involvement, and present a background check on herself.

In addition to being very active in school,

making good grades is very important to Liner. She is aware how grades impact the future of a young life. As an honor student, she continues to set higher goals for herself.

Just as she educates her friends about the dangers of drugs and alcohol, the importance of good grades and other things she also works hard to prevent teen pregnancies.

With school a priority, she doesn't have much time to spare but she doesn't mind. She enjoys her role on the Principal's Advisory Board, filling the position as president of the **Bradley Central High School Ruri-Teen Club** (TN), the sophomore class secretary and being a member of the executive board of the Student Council. She's also a member of the Drama Cub, Earth Club, Christian Crusaders Bible Study, DECA Leadership, HOSA Medical Field Club and FCCLA.

"It's a joy for me to be involved in my school and my hometown," said Liner. "Being so busy doesn't leave me much free time but I don't mind. I enjoy doing things to help me with my future plans



Even after the life participant dies, dues will be transferred quarterly to Ruritan National, thus offering a perpetual memorial to the organization on behalf of the deceased Ruritan.

A "Ruritan Forever" endowment may be purchased by a member in good standing, or may be purchased for a member in good standing. A Ruritan Forever endowment may be purchased to honor a non-member provided they are brought into a club as an Associate Member at the same time. In this case the Associate Member's dues would be covered by the \$600 endowment.

The lifetime endowment may also be purchased

in memory of an already deceased Ruritan, ensuring an ongoing contribution to the operation of Ruritan in his or her name. Dues for a living participant must be current through the previous quarter to participate. The Plan Manager, at Ruritan National, will administer these prepaid dues in a separate fund with the original amount remaining in perpetuity. Interest on the fund will provide the money paid to Ruritan National for dues. A "Ruritan Forever" Committee will oversee the fund.

Upon payment of the fee, the Ruritan will receive a certificate, a permanent life participant card and a pin. For endowments purchased for a deceased member a special plaque will be provided for the club to present to the deceased member's family. National dues increases will have no effect on participants enrolled in the plan, although the purchase price of \$600 for new enrollees may be adjusted over the years as necessary. There will be no special assessments or charges made to Ruritan Forever participants.



MILITARY SERVICE

U.S. Military personnel who are also Ruritans and who might be unable to attend regular meetings should not be counted as absent according to the Ruritan National Board of Directors.

If your club has a member currently serving in active duty, your club secretary should count him or her as "present" at meetings so that his or her absence doesn't penalize the member or cause the club to fall short on attendance percentages.

The Board cited the National Constitutional provision for using "four hours of community service" as the equivalent of a make-up meeting -- a substitution that members of the U.S. Military are surely qualified to use.

Ruritans Recognized as Backbone of Community

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One of my Saturday morning chores is to load up all the trash and take it out to the Washington County Convenience Center.

It makes me wonder sometimes what county government would be like if it was all run by the Ruritans instead of the politicians. It bears repeating once in a while that the entire history of trash collection and recycling in the area came from the impetus of the **Washington County** (TN) Ruritan, and especially from Larry Waddle, its frequent president over the years.

It was Larry who got sick and tired of everyone using the slopes of Hog Eye Road, near his house, as a dumping ground for everything from refrigerators to tires to household garbage to hazardous materials and dead animals.

He haunted the Washington County Commission until it agreed to assist the Ruritan in setting up a recycling center and to haul the rest of the trash away. Larry was tireless in finding markets for recyclables and for equipping the center with crushers, a tow motor and other heavy machinery needed. He found a way to bring the necessary three-phase electricity out to that distant location.

Eventually the work bit back at him. An infection from a nail that went through his shoe cost him his leg. Today the center is manned entirely by county employees and became a model for other recycling centers, not only in the county, but across the country.

When I go to Bowmantown for bird watching I always stop at the **Bowmantown** (TN) Ruritan to bird the woods along the road before heading into the Henderson Marsh.

The **Limestone** (TN) Ruritan, like Washington College, has built its own clubhouse and holds regular dinners for the community. It was this chapter that pioneered rural fire protection throughout the county by buying its own fire truck and beginning the Limestone Volunteer Fire Department, followed by the Limestone First Responders. My first story with this paper was on the Limestone First Responders, and the good relations from those days eventually led me to write the text for a photographic history of Limestone published by Arcadia's Images of America Series.

They also laid the groundwork for Davy Crockett State Park. When I pass the **Telford** (TN) Ruritan on the way to the convenience center I see the cannery in their building and the walking track they've built for

community residents. Leesburg has done the same.

Throughout the county, it is the Ruritans that have built the baseball fields and other aspects of rural recreation. From these dusty fields several players have gone into professional baseball and even into the major leagues. Back in the day, before aggraded baseball, they'd return to their home fields and play alongside younger players trying to make their way.

Yet when Ruritans pursue these programs, it all comes out of their pocket, without the kind of price breaks that county or state government can acquire.

I could go on about scholarship programs and other worthwhile activities. The problem, however, is the aging of Ruritan members, just like the aging of Shriners, and those who belong to other organizations that benefit the community by volunteer work.

These organizations are the backbone of the community, and without a backbone the community cannot stand. It was a lot simpler when young people worked on their dad's farm. Now they and their wives have gone for a job in the town, and there just isn't time enough to go to Ruritan dinners and to work on the ball field. I wish I knew the answer to that.
