Message From Executive Director Michael Chrisley

Incorporate Ruritan Into Your Summer Activities



Summer is a time of beginnings. I just returned from the Founders' Day Celebration in Holland Va. I remember the first time I ever attended a Founders' Day Celebration and stood at the monument, thinking that just across the street an idea was born. This idea became the organization that we know today. Our

organization started as a group of concerned citizens in a small community and grew to an organization that has a presence in 25 states, over 1,000 communities, and is nearly 30,000 members strong. The underlying purpose of that first meeting and subsequent meetings of that group in Holland was concern for the community and how this group of people could help. That is still our idea today. The numbers are impressive, but more impressive than the size of the organization is the difference local clubs make in thousands of peoples' lives day after day, year after year. I have been involved with Ruritan on some level for 34 years. Every year I become more aware of the importance of the local club and volunteer. The real work of Ruritan is done at the club level. What we are is defined at the club level.

At the national office we are beginning to work on the outside of the building. We are cleaning up and getting ready for summer. Over the last several years we have made significant improvements to the physical plant that have been aimed at creating heating and cooling efficiencies that will save money for years. It is time, however, to do work that will make the outside of the building look better. Our building is nearly 50 years old and time has taken its toll. That work has started in small ways with

mowing, planting, and mulching. We have plans for painting and additional landscaping so that we can be proud of our building and what it represents not only in our community but because it represents Ruritan nationwide. As the weather warms we have Ruritan visitors dropping by nearly every day. Some were in the area recently for college graduation and took advantage of being in the neighborhood to see their national office. We love to see these folks and want them to be proud of their national office. We have cleared and mulched the front patio area of the building temporarily as we wait to pave that area with engraved pavers from the paver program. We have nearly enough pavers to make our first order and begin that work. If you haven't donated a paver yet see page 27 of the March Newsletter or visit the website.

Inside the building we have just completed the installation of a new server/network. We are fortunate to have Past National Director Carroll Lowe, a technology engineer from the Piedmont District, who has done so much to advance Ruritan technology over the years. The weekend prior to Founders' Day, Carroll came up and spent roughly 30 hours migrating data from the old server over to the new one. Not only did he come, but he brought his wife Sandra who worked with him all weekend to set up our new network. We are thankful and grateful to Carroll and Sandra who did all this without any compensation.

We hope you have a great summer with family and friends. Some of the best friends I have are Ruritan members I have met over the years. Invite new members to your summer activities. They might become some of the best friends you will have down the road.

Top Member Recruiter for 2013 - Julia Hopkins

The top Ruritan recruiter for 2013 was Julia Hopkins from the **Smithfield** (VA) Ruritan Club in the Holland District. Recruiters were recognized from large, medium, and small clubs, and Julia topped all categories. Julia came back from the Northern KY Convention inspired to personally recruit

new members and to inspire her Smithfield Ruritans to recruit. She brought home two powerful words with her: JUST ASK! She wanted to see her club become more diverse. In early 2013 there were no business or youth members, but that was about to change. Julia Hopkins, at just five feet tall, is a giant presence for sharing Ruritan! By the spring, she knew she could achieve her goal of recruiting new members. She was selected as a WANTED Program winner. Her name was drawn from the quarterly drawing. She was a \$400 winner. One would think that the recognition of having her picture on the back cover of the Ruritan Magazine would be enough. This only inspired her more.

Julia was thrilled to be asked to share how she recruited 28 members.

Did you have a plan as to whom you would recruit for potential members? If so, what was your plan? First I read the Ruritan Club and District Officers Handbook on membership and discovered that businesses could join as associate members. I asked our businesses that had supported the club in the past. They were delighted to join. The plaque for businesses became a selling tool. I took my family business plaque from "Smithfield Farms" to show other business owners.

Were there certain activities/programs that potential members found appealing enough to pursue membership with your club? The focus on helping our community was the ticket. I appealed to the youth by going with them to our local nursing home and putting up bird feeders and filling bird feeders. The kids got their picture in the local newspaper. They were so delighted! We also had the kids participate in our Christmas Parade for the first time. The kids decorated the truck, and one wore the Rudy Bear costume. Their parents enjoyed being involved

also.

Did you follow up on any of those who initially told you "no?" Yes and no – it depended on the situation. A local printing company said no, but that they would be willing to help in other ways. So when we needed flyers for our club car show, they printed 500 flyers for us. Some people were on the fence. Whenever I saw them, I always told them that they would be great assets for our club. The mayor was a prime example because he belonged to every other civic club in town, but I got him to join as a business member for his construction company.

What tips do you have to share to other Ruritan members and clubs about recruiting new members? JUST ASK!!! You will never know you can do recruiting unless you ask. If you get a "no" just turn that "no" into "on" and just keep "on" asking. Our country needs us, and our communities need us. One of my favorite phrases is "We make a living by what we get, but we make a life by what we give."

What are your recruiting plans for 2014? I plan to just keep on asking. I would like to see more youth get on board. I also have several new neighbors that I am looking forward to recruiting. Also, I have contacted several businesses already.

You have compared recruiting to your son's hiking trip. Please share the story.

My youngest son, Scott, graduated from JMU and came home to apply for dental school. He studied diligently for the dental exam and had several dental school interviews. When he got accepted at the University of Maryland Dental School, he said he wanted to walk the entire Appalachian Trail. The trail started in Springer, GA, and he wanted me to take him there. Being a mother, the first thing out of my mouth was "Oh no, there will be lions, tigers, and bears. How are you going to eat or is the bear going to eat you?"

Scott just looked at me, handed me the Appalachian Trail book, and said, "Don't worry, Mom. You are going to send me my food! I will text you what I need and where to ship the box."

So for three months and over 2,200 miles he climbed the mountains, and I sent boxes of homemade trail mix, granola bars, Little Debbie cakes, etc. Finally, the last box went out to Hanover, NH. I dropped it off at the UPS Store and I said, "Alleluia!" Two days later Scott called. "Mom, we've got a problem," he said. He continued, "That last box you sent was to an outfitters store. I'm standing outside that store, and they have gone out of business."

I reminded him that he was standing on Main

Street, in front of the store where the package was to be delivered that very day. The package was on a UPS truck. I suggested that he chase down every UPS truck he saw and ask if his box was ON their truck. So Scott was off to chase down UPS trucks and wave them down until they pulled over. Later, I stared at my phone when up pops the text: GOT IT MOM! THANKS!

Scott went through snowstorms, heavy rain, and unthinkable conditions. He never gave up and is known as a "Thorough Hiker" – the title given to those who complete the trail from Springer, GA, to Katahdin, ME.

We all need that perseverance for recruiting new members!

Passing of Past National Directors James Dean Carr and Denzel "Denny" Tunks

Past National Director James Dean Carr, Sr. died on March 6 with his family by his side. He is survived by his faithful wife of over 69 years, Emma Lucille Leonard Carr of Waddell Nursing Home; son J.D. Carr, Jr. and the late Ruth Ann; daughter Pat Moser (Chipper) Thornton of Summerfield, North Carolina; grandson Jay III; great-grandchildren Shannon, Shelby and Jayson Carr; granddaughter Paula (Donnie) Melton and great-granddaughters Paige and Tiffany; granddaughter-in-law Christy and great-grandson-in-law Jesse Davis

His lifetime passion was establishing the Fairview Ruritan Club and 25 other clubs throughout the surrounding communities and as far away as South Boston. He was instrumental in building the existing Fairview Ruritan Club structure and he loved to maintain the building as well as keeping the grounds in shape. He was a charter member since 1953 and served several terms as president of the club. He was the New River District Governor in 1970 and 1971. In addition, he was national director from 1979 to 1981. On November 5, 2011, he was honored by the New River District Ruritans by dedicating the convention to his honor and to show their admiration to him for his 57 years of fellowship, goodwill and community service to the people of the New River District.

Dean entered the U.S. Coast Guard Reserves on April 7,1943, and went for training to Manhattan Beach. He served in the Coast Guard only a few short days before he was Honorably Discharged due to a medical condition.

Funeral service was held on Saturday, March 8, 2014, at the Mt. Vale United Methodist Church with the Rev. Jeff Callahan and the Rev. Ted Bartlett officiating. Memorial contributions may be made to the **Fairview** (VA) Ruritan Club, P.O. Box 486, Galax, Virginia 24333 for the club to continue their assistance for those in need in the community.

Past National Director Denzel "Denny" Tunks, age 82, died on February 12, surrounded by family at the Winchester Medical Center in Winchester, VA after suffering a heart attack at home.

Denny joined the US Marine Corps in November 1951. He received high marks in all areas during his military service. Denny fought during the Korean War from April 1952 until May 1953. Denny's family discovered after his death that he had received the Korean Service Medal with two stars, The United Nations Medal, and the National Defense Service Medal. He was honorably discharged in March 1956. He then joined the National Guard and made his home in Paola, Kansas. Denny married Carolee Downs on March 19, 1955. They were married until her death on August 27, 1998. Their son, John Charles Tunks also preceded Denny in death.

Denny married Cheryl Spencer January 17, 2002. They first made their home in Paola, Kansas. They traveled extensively with their best friends, Patty and Dale Moser to Colorado, Florida, Indiana, Iowa, Kentucky, Missouri, Nebraska, South Carolina, South Dakota, Tennessee, and Texas. In 2012 Denny and Cheryl moved to Ohio and then to Kearneysville, WV. For over 30 years, he was a member of the **Paola** (KS) and **Block** (KS) Ruritan Clubs, where he held all club and district offices during his membership. He was a national director for Ruritan from 2002 to 2004. Service and interment was held with full military honors provided by the US Marine Corps and representation by the Patriot Guard Riders on February 21, 2014, at Quantico National Cemetery in Triangle, VA.

like additional explanation/information. Also, this is the last of a two-year partnership agreement between the Foundation and Ameriprise Financial. Their representatives will help provide financial planning and other educational resources to assist our Ruritan members. The Trustees voted to extend this partnership for an additional two years so representatives will be on hand at the 2015 Ruritan National Convention in Greensboro for easy access to our Ruritan members.

Your Trustees met in Dublin, VA, on April 16-17 to review and score grant applications and to determine the amount of your Build-Your-Dollar (BYD) Club Scholarships. A total of 368 Ruritan Clubs submitted their \$300 plus all forms as required and on time. These clubs will receive an additional \$245 for a total of \$545 and that's a return of 81.7% on an investment of \$300 from as late as October 1 last year until April 1 of this year. The Trustees also reviewed 61 additional individual grant applications and were able to award a total of 29 grants of \$600 each; 28 traditional and 1 non-traditional. When you do the math though, that still leaves more than 30, most of whom were deserving that we were unable to award. That's where each of you, our Ruritan members can help. In order to award these additional grants, your Foundation must grow. Remember the goal - grow the total corpus of your Foundation to at least \$5,000,000 in 2014. This can only happen with your help in supporting your Foundation. This goal is fully achievable with your help.

In closing, I would like to express my sincere thanks to all supporters of the Foundation. You are valued

A Perpetual Life Plan

Ruritan Forever is a plan for the payment of national dues by members who wish to make a long-term investment in Ruritan.

The "Ruritan Forever" plan would allow a member in good standing to pay \$600 and become a life-time participant of the National Organization.

Ruritan National will invest these pre-payments in a special managed fund. transferring the national dues quarterly to the business office of Ruritan National. Even after the life participant dies, dues will be transferred quarterly to Ruritan National, thus offering a perpetual memorial to the organization on behalf of the deceased Ruritan.

A Ruritan Forever endowment may be purchased by or for a member in good standing. The lifetime endowment may also be purchased in memory of an already deceased Ruritan, ensuring an ongoing contribution to the operation of Ruritan in his or her name. Dues for a living participant must be current through the previous quarter to participate. The plan manager, at Ruritan National, will administer these prepaid dues in a separate fund with the original amount remaining in perpetuity. Interest on the fund will provide the money paid to Ruritan National for national dues.

Upon payment of the fee, the Ruritan will receive a certificate on a plague, a lapel pin, and a permanent life participant card. Dues increases will have no effect on participants enrolled in the plan, although the purchase price of \$600 may be adjusted over the years as necessary. There will be no special assessments or charges made to Ruritan Forever participants. 
