


Ruritan Celebrates 90th Anniversary

Message From Executive Director Michael Chrisley Fun with a Purpose



It was the perfect day. The sun was shining brightly, it was in the low 70's and there was just a slight breeze. Nearly 150 of us had gathered in Winchester, Virginia to play some golf. How could it get any better? Let me tell you. Today was different. We knew that we were going to have some fun, but in addition to having fun we were

playing golf with a purpose. For over 20 years the **Rappahannock District** has sponsored a golf tournament. Each year the tournament raises nearly \$10,000. In 20 plus years that's over \$200,000 for the Ruritan National Foundation. But one member of Rappahannock District, Joe Hulver, was not satisfied with that and suggested that the annual

funds raised from the tournament be used to match donations for Tom Downing Fellows. Still easy math. \$200,000 times two is approaching a half million dollars.

This money is invested through the Tom Downing Fellow Fund which is unrestricted. Unrestricted funds are used to fund the Build Your Dollar program in the Foundation. The Foundation invests donations with a money manager. Our investments have done very well over the years. All this taken together means that more and more students receive the benefit of a scholarship from the Ruritan Foundation through the local club. Win for the Foundation, Win for the local club, most importantly Win for the Student. Not your typical day of colf

day of golf.

The Foundation has given thousands of scholarships over the years. Every time we help a young person succeed we help our country and hometowns all over the country. These young people will be the leaders of our future. As one of our former **Ruritan National Presidents** used to say "young people make up a small percentage of our current membership but they make up 100% of our future membership." He was 100% correct.

We hope you have a great summer of fun. If you have



the opportunity, have "fun with a purpose." HOW HEALTHY IS YOUR CLUB?

A recent article my wife Janet shared with me from one of her Delta Kappa Gamma sources is relevant to our Ruritan organization. The article was entitled "How Healthy is Your Chapter?" Herein I have applied those thoughts to Ruritan clubs.

Each Ruritan Club has a personality and energy of its own. And just as in life, club strength ebbs and flows as members join or leave. New members bring fresh ideas and provide new leaders for the future.

Vivacious clubs invite and initiate diverse members to join and then mentor those members to become involved in club activities and projects. The leaders of this type of club establish what programs and projects are most relevant to their members. They solicit ideas from the membership and are open to trying new things – or retrying things that have been tried before – in an effort to be inclusive and forward thinking. This type of club has an energetic leadership core and fosters new leadership growth so that the core stays strong. They support one another in times of joy and strife. They are a team.

The ailing club looks and feels much different. The core of the leaders has dwindled, and they are tired from the drudgery of doing the same job repeatedly. While they profess exhaustion, however, they hold on to leadership and are hesitant to let younger members lead. Many such clubs have not initiated new members in several years, saying they do not know people who might be interested in joining their clubs. If they have in fact initiated new members, they don't have a plan to mentor them and lose them within a short period of time. Programs and projects are rehashed because that's easy, or the club becomes a supper club, losing the purposes of Ruritan. Members may have a rigid belief in doing things as they have always been done or, conversely, believing that since something did not work before, it won't work now. There are cliques within the club and sometimes divisiveness.

What can a club do to remain resilient and lively? Annie Webb Blanton, an educator years ago whose vision led to the formation of the Delta Kappa Gamma organization to unite key women educators, said it best as follows: "Be progressive. Keep up with the moving world while not discarding what in the old has value. But, don't cling to the old when its worth has passed. Don't be a person so set in your views that nothing can change you."

To prevent further rapid decline of Ruritan, it is paramount that we work towards developing and creating more vivacious clubs in order to achieve meaningful and needed growth. A failure to do so will attain undesirable results.

2019 Convention Entertainment

Are you ready for another great convention? President Guy Cox and the committee are working to make the 2019 National Convention another exceptional, educational, and exciting convention. Plans are underway for an amazing veterans speaker and for awesome entertainment at the First Lady's Lunch and the Installation Banquet.

After the Friday morning business session, retired Colonel Ward Nickish will be our veterans speaker. Colonel Nickish's last assignment was the Director of Casualty and Memorial Affairs for the US Army. While in this position he supervised the US Army's Central Identification Laboratory – Hawaii, which conducted the search, recovery, identification, and repatriation of the soldiers, of all military services, whose bodies were never recovered from all prior wars and conflicts.

He has participated in recovery missions in Vietnam, and he served as a senior member of the United States Delegation to the first bilateral talks with the Democratic People's Republic of Korea. These historically significant talks resulted in the agreement for the conduct of the first Joint Recovery Operations into North Korea beginning in July 1996. He was honored to be directly involved in the planning and implementation of the events relating to the disinterment and identification of the remains



of the Vietnam Unknown from the Tomb of the Unknowns at Arlington National Cemetery in 1998. Colonel Nickisch remains active in veterans affairs at the local, state, and national levels. Colonel Nickisch is from Gainesville, Virginia, where he is a member of the Gainesville Ruritan Club.

"I have known since 2010 when I first heard Mr. Nickisch speak at the Rappahannock District Convention



that if I ever got in the position where I could introduce him to a group of Ruritans, I would be ecstatic. His presentation is thrilling, and you will be amazed at the information he will give you pertaining to the recovery and many steps that are used to recover POW's/MIA's from so many different global conflicts," states President Guy.

If you are attending the Friday Lunch honoring First Lady Linda, then you are in for a treat! The Sounds of Liberty will be coming to perform for us. Sounds of Liberty is Liberty University's flagship traveling music group. Since 1975, this

team has represented Liberty University on some of the nation's most prestigious platforms. Today, as part of the Liberty Worship Collective, Sounds of Liberty continues to minister in churches, schools, and various civic organizations.

Sounds of Liberty is a handpicked group of talented singers. Less than three percent of those auditioned are selected to be part of the group. The group is made up of twelve very talented singers and musicians. You do not want to miss these talented group of singers.

"Upon attending the Peaks of Otter Convention last year, we had the distinct pleasure of listening to the Sounds of Liberty group of young adults during dinner. Their talent, dedication, and professionalism was outstanding and I immediately knew they would be appreciated by all Ruritans at the First Lady's Luncheon. We approached them about coming and they were pleased with the invitation to attend a Ruritan National Convention. I am so looking forward to hearing them again," said First Lady Linda.

Lumber mills, bark tanneries, a stave and heading factory, and other enterprises attracted many workers, and the town's population reached 1,500 by 1905. A passenger depot, post office, hoopital, hotels, stores, and a church served the community. Stokesville declined after 1910 as the area's timber supply dwindled. A flood in 1949 destroyed most of its remaining structures. The town was named for the Stokes family, financial backers of the railroad.
