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Message From Executive Director Michael Chrisley



Is Volunteering a Thing of the Past?

Is volunteering a thing of the past? How would you answer that question? We all know from the statistical evidence that our number of members is slowly shrinking. Does that mean people don't volunteer anymore? Has our society changed so much that people

no longer care about the fate of those around them? Are we so interested in our own well-being that we don't care about others? I don't think any of that is true.

What I do think is true is that volunteering and volunteers are changing. Several studies show that volunteerism is actually up in the United States. However, the way volunteers give of their time has changed. The term episodic volunteer was coined a few years ago because that was the way people chose to serve. People are interested in seeing a need, planning to fix it, fixing it and then moving on to the next need. There may be gaps in the time between when the volunteer decides that a need should be addressed and finding or addressing the next need. People are more interested in short bursts of meaningful service without the restraint of an ongoing commitment.

What could that mean for us? Our model looks for people who will join our clubs and volunteer through the club for extended periods of time. We have members who have been members of clubs for 50 or more years. We have clubs that have been in existence for even longer.

The current studies show that some people are

not as interested in that model as they used to be. I believe that what it means for us is that when the episodic volunteer decides to give their time, we have to be the best choice they can make. We have to have mechanisms in place to allow for volunteers to seek us out and serve in any way they choose. We have to have a model that is flexible enough to allow members to serve without restrictions.

I believe we are changing to meet those needs now. We offer some membership types that allow for members to serve when they can and not be obligated to attend every meeting or be involved with every fundraiser or service project. The associate membership is one of those types. The affiliate membership is another.

There is still a need for the traditional model, but I believe that comes from specific groups. AARP did a study years ago that talked about how people aged 45 and up fit that category best. That group typically has a vested interest in the community they live in (because they are usually long-term residents). They tend to have reached a place in life where they see the need to give back. They have finished raising their children. They are in a place of financial independence. They fit our model.

We should continue to recruit into the traditional model. We should also look for ways to satisfy the needs of volunteers who want to give of themselves in a more flexible way. We should always keep our goal in view, making our local community a better place to live and work.

Recent Ruritan National Board Action

In August 2018 the Ruritan National Board voted to amend the **Ruritan Club Bylaws** (Article IV Fees and Dues, Section E). The section previously stated "Except for club dues and applicable district dues, members shall not be assessed for contributions for any sole purpose. Proceeds from club fundraising should not be used for meals and dues." The board's motion changed "should not" to "shall not" making the section end with "Proceeds from club fundraising shall not be used for meals and dues."


The **Ruritan Club Bylaws** were also amended by the Board at its January 2019 meeting (Article IV Attendance, Section B). The section previously stated, in part, "... attendance made up in accordance with the rules set forth above, must have been within one (1) calendar month immediately before or following the day of absence." After the Board action that section now reads "... attendance made up in accordance with the rules set forth above, must have been within the entire calendar month before or the entire calendar month after a missed meeting to make up the meeting missed."

Our journey began when we met in church while we were in high school. We began dating and on June 23, 1973 at the ages of 19 (Lee) and 20 we were married.



Fast forward to today, Nick is 29 years old, has a 4-year college degree with a minor in Homeland Security and a major in Criminal Justice. He is a member of the United States Air Force Reserve as a Senior Airman. He was recently awarded the The Air Force Achievement Medal for his seven-month tour at the Mortuary Affairs Unit where he escorted the fallen heroes and aided their families. In addition he is a full-time paraprofessional with the Capitol School District working with special needs children. If that is not enough, he is a 6th degree black belt teaching karate as well as being a certified instructor in self-defense for first responders, police, and military. As you can tell, we are very proud of our son. Hopefully our experience will encourage another couple to begin the rewarding journey of becoming an adoptive parent."


The first screen you will see after logging in is a message screen. Periodically staff or Runtan leaders will post a firmely message there for users.







The winner, Deeya Patel, 14 years old, also won last year's Bee.





Ruritan Forever

A Perpetual Life Plan

Protecting and preserving Ruritan as a legacy for future generations.

"Ruritan Forever" is a plan for the payment of <u>national</u> dues by members who wish to make a long term investment in Ruritan. The "Ruritan Forever" plan allows a member in good standing to pay \$600 and become a life-time participant of the National Organization. Ruritan National will invest these prepayments in a special managed fund, transferring the dues quarterly to the business office of Ruritan National. Even after the life participant dies, dues will be transferred quarterly to Ruritan National, thus offering a perpetual memorial to the organization on behalf of the deceased Ruritan.

A "Ruritan Forever" endowment may be purchased by a member in good standing or may be purchased for a member in good standing. A Ruritan Forever endowment may be purchased to honor a non-member provided they are brought into a club as an Associate Member at the same time. In this case the Associate Member's dues would be covered by the \$600 endowment.

The lifetime endowment may also be purchased in

memory of an already deceased Ruritan, ensuring an ongoing contribution to the operation of Ruritan in his or her name. Dues for a living participant must be current through the previous quarter to participate. Ruritan National will administer these prepaid dues in a separate fund with the original amount remaining in perpetuity. Interest on the fund will provide the money paid to Ruritan National for dues.

Upon payment of the fee, the Ruritan will receive a certificate, a lapel pin, and a permanent life participant card. For endowments purchased for a deceased member a special plaque will be provided for the club to present to the deceased member's family. **National** dues increases will have no effect on participants enrolled in the plan, although the purchase price of \$600 for new enrollees may be adjusted over the years as necessary. There will be no special assessments or charges made to Ruritan Forever participants.


