


I come before you tonight with a thankful and humble heart, I want to thank each of you for putting your trust in me, and for your support to help guide this organization to success throughout this year.



First Lady Anne Hedgspeth's project this year is St. Jude Children's Research Hospital. St. Jude Children's Research Hospital is leading the way in how the world understands, treats, and defeats childhood cancer and other life-threatening diseases. St. Jude treats approximately 8,500 patients each year. Cancer is diagnosed each year in approximately 175,000 children 14 and under worldwide. Treatments invented at St. Jude have helped push the overall childhood cancer survival rate from 20 percent to more than 80 percent since the hospital opened in 1962. St. Jude is working to drive the overall survival rate for childhood cancer to 90 percent, and they don't want to stop until no child dies from cancer. St. Jude freely shares the discoveries it makes, and every child saved at St. Jude means doctors and scientists worldwide can use that knowledge to save thousands more children. Families never receive a bill from St. Jude for treatment, travel, housing or food - because all a family should worry about is helping their child live.

"St. Jude has compassion for sick and hurting children, and a desire to nurture and heal them through research and treatment. I share the same passion as St. Jude, and want to help nurture and heal the children by helping to provide financial support to the research center. This will allow the doctors and their research teams to continue their work to find cures," said Anne.

Kingsport Recap

The 2020 Ruritan National Convention held in Kingsport, Tennessee, was a memorable, informational, and educational convention. National officers were elected and installed, awards were presented, donations were given, business was conducted, and Ruritans enjoyed fellowship.

Activities started on Wednesday, January 8, with the January Board of Directors meeting held at the Yuma Ruritan Club. The club provided a great meal and space not only for the Board meeting but for First Lady Nelda to host the directors' spouses and guests for a time of fellowship. The fellowship and fun continued on Wednesday evening when the Bloomingdale Ruritan Club hosted the board and guests at their club building.



On Thursday, January 9, the convention opened with exhibits that included the Ruritan Foundation Silent Auction and Ruritan Supply. On Thursday morning, President Elect Linward Hedgspeth led the training of the 2020 Ruritan National Governors. Thursday afternoon a preconvention workshop was presented by the Kingsport Convention Bureau. Also, the owner of Bellafina Chocolates, a local shop, shared her community service projects. On Thursday evening, the official opening of the convention began with the Flag Ceremony and recognition of veterans. The impressive and

moving flag ceremony was presented by 1995 National President Frank Guthrie, who introduced the Honor and Remember Flag and presented Gold Star Mother Brenda Shelton. Ending the evening were outstanding military speakers, Retired Air Force General Charles Lyon and Mrs. Karen Lyon.





Friday's activities began with a memorial service, led by Pastor Lori Hays. Attendees could bring mementos or write notes about Ruritan members or loved ones and place them on the stage as a remembrance. The business session was the next activity, where reports were given, candidates made speeches, Kingsport Mayor Patrick Shull welcomed our attendees to Kingsport, and the Rudy Youth of the Year Award for 2019 was presented to Emily Adams, a member of the Landes Club in the Upper West Virginia District. Emily spent over 400 hours on club projects and has served as her district song leader. While managing her schoolwork she was ac-

tive in playing sports, serving as a member of the community education outreach services, and participating in her church's

youth group. The 2019 Ruri-Teen of the Year Award was presented to Megan Meyerhoeffer from the South Spotswood Ruri-Teen Club and Cross Keys-Mill Creek Club in the Rockingham District. Megan has served as president and sgt-at-arms for her Ruri-Teen club. She completed seven projects and spent 160 hours working on them. Additionally, she served as an officer in her local FFA and PTSA. The Ruritan of the Year for 2019 was Larry Richardson of the Collettsville Club in the Western North Carolina District. He has been a member since 1971 and held club, zone, and district offices. He spent over 750 hours working on club projects. Larry has also recruited at least 11 new mem-

The Foundation live auction was held on Friday evening followed by Ruritan Square, a giant tail gate party. This first-time ever fellowship event was well attended and enjoyed by all who participated. The evening featured Ruritan-style horse rac-



ing, a scooter parade, and 17 tables of assorted food and beverages supplied by clubs, districts, and individuals. This giant party was well received, and praise was given to all who participated by supplying food and entertainment. Ruritan attendees showed off their favorite college and professional team apparel while participating in the fun activities and enjoying the delicious food in Ruritan Square.

All 2020 Ruritan District Lieutenant Governors should plan to attend the 2020 Summer Leadership Conference in Dublin, VA at the New River Community College in June. Current Lt. Governors are expensed to this conference.

Lt. Governors are required to attend this conference to be eligible for reimbursement of one half of their National Convention expenses.

Current District Governors and Zone Governors are not required to attend this conference but are highly recommended to attend.

One area of concern for all Ruritan members is the growth of the organization. We will have some "experts" that have built Ruritan membership and Ruritan clubs who will give some useful advice on how you can build your clubs and districts. President Elect Glen and the Leadership Committee are planning the training around the theme: One Team, One Direction, Up." There will be classes that will benefit all Ruritans.

The conference gives Ruritan leaders the opportunity to learn more about their responsibilities, share ideas, express concerns, and plan for the future of the organization.

It also provides an opportunity for leaders to learn about the responsibilities that go along with other leadership positions they may wish to seek and encourages them to move up in their leadership roles. Information on the conference's content and cost will be sent to 2020 district leaders later this spring. Lodging rooms will be blocked for this conference at the Dublin area hotels.

The conference brings Ruritan leaders together to discuss concerns and plan for the future of the organization. Attendees will also learn the latest information about Ruritan programs and procedures. As stated earlier, Lt. Governors are expensed to this conference, others may attend at their own expense and for a nominal registration fee. Special circumstances such as substitutions will be considered on a case by case basis by the Ruritan National President.

- 1. 2020 District Lt. Governors will be paid $\frac{1}{2}$ of their expenses to the 2021 National Convention in Covington, KY provided they complete the requirements below.
- 2. They attend the June 2020 Summer Leadership Conference (unless excused in writing by the National President).
 - 3. They attend the Governors' Training at the 2021 National Convention.
 - 4. They attend substantially all meetings at the 2021 National Convention.
- 5. Form R-35 must be received by Ruritan National no later than November 10 and Form R-36 must be received by Ruritan National no later than February 10.

All expense vouchers must be submitted within 90 days after the 2021 National Convention. Current District Governors are eligible for $\frac{1}{2}$ of their expenses to be paid to the National Convention providing that numbers 4 and 5 above are satisfied.


As a result of that diligence, the Foundation was again able to give back to you \$600 for your BY\$ scholarship awards.





Western North Carolina District is Making a Difference

Three High Country Ruritan clubs were among 65 community groups recently recognized at the WNC Communities 70th annual WNC Honors Awards Program at the Doubletree by Hilton Biltmore-Asheville in Asheville.

According to Terri Wells, Director of Community and Agricultural Programs for WNC Communities, the awards program is built on a 70-year tradition of recognizing rural community development clubs for

their innovative ideas and grassroots solutions.

"These centers and clubs are the backbone running through our beloved mountains," she said, adding that 250 community leaders from 13 Western North Carolina Counties and the Eastern Band of Cherokee Indians attended the November 2 awards luncheon.

"The 65 communities participating in this year's program made a \$6 mil-

lion investment of time, talent, money and effort in our Western North Carolina Communities," Wells explained. "Their fundraising efforts brought in \$950,000 with more than 5,500 volunteers investing an impressive 195,500 hours of their time in outreach programs dedicated to conservation, education, beautification, health, wellness, and economic development."

Deep Gap Ruritan Club of Watauga County and The **Peak Cr**eek Ruritan Club of Ashe County were recognized in the category of "Engaged Communities" — involved in numerous programs impacting their residents — and each received a cash award of \$500.

"Members of the Deep Gap Ruritan Club attended this year's WNC Honors Awards, and were recognized for their achievements," Wells said. "The club cleared more than \$11,000 on their prime rib steak dinner and raffle this year. That money is distributed throughout the year to individuals and families in need, to local organizations who support those in need, and to provide scholarships for deserving students. One of the main goals of Ruritan is to provide service to the local community."

She further explained, "Ruritan service projects are divided into five areas: Environment, Business, Citizenship, Social Development, and Public Service. Deep Gap members donated 4,634 hours of

their time, and the club donated \$17,660 to help enhance the quality of life in their community. Deep Gap partners with other organizations in the community to provide food, financial help, and support of those who need a helping hand."

Peak Creek Ruritan continues "careful building maintenance," Wells noted. "They own and use the Laurel Springs Community building as their clubhouse; it is also the main asset to the entire eastern part of Ashe county for a variety of uses, such as

wedding receptions, anniversary celebrations, government agency meetings, voting, and fundraisers held by other groups. The pancake breakfast and indoor yard sale continues to be their biggest fundraiser, and it allows them to fund freshman scholarships. If the student chooses to attend a college which is a 'partner' with the national Ruritan Foundation, then the college and the Ruritan Foundation match the

award given by the club. Fifty percent of the Club's scholarship winners indicate that they plan to return to their area to work after graduation and serve their community."

Foscoe Ruritan Club was honored as one of the "Participating Communities" and received a cash award of \$250 for its successful projects implemented during the past year. Those include its annual Home Grown Music Festival, its most successful fundraiser, and the club's support of Valle Crucis Elementary School, the Civil Air Patrol, Junior ROTC, the Foscoe Fire Department, two scholarships and medical assistance to community members.



The second club was also able to invite and install three new members as a result of the meeting. They are now targeting other clubs below 16 members to do the same.


One of the community meetings also identified another community for a potential new club. They are scheduling an information meeting in this community.


Western Yell County Donates to Operation Christmas Child

enhances Ruritans financial future by providing income forever. It honors members for meritorious service and aids in retention of Ruritan membership.



Annually Ruritan loses more than 400 members to death. The endowment from Ruritan Forever membership continues to fund Ruritan work if they are a Ruritan Forever. Once a member dies the income from the endowment becomes non dues revenue. So, not only does it benefit a Ruritan member to become a Ruritan Forever because they no longer have to pay national dues, but it also benefits all Ruritan members. This is true because when we generate larger amounts of nondues revenue it extends the time between dues increases.

The member will never be assessed national dues no matter how long they are a member The member will not be impacted by any future dues increases When the member dies their endowment will continue to fund Ruritan initiatives

Both of these Ruritan members served their communities for 54 years or more and will now continue to serve Ruritan through the Ruritan Forever Endowment.

A Perpetual Life Plan

Protecting and preserving Ruritan as a legacy for future generations.

"Ruritan Forever" is a plan for the payment of <u>national</u> dues by members who wish to make a long term investment in Ruritan. The "Ruritan Forever" plan allows a member in good standing to pay \$600 and become a life-time participant of the National Organization. Ruritan National will invest these prepayments in a special managed fund, transferring the dues quarterly to the business office of Ruritan National. Even after the life participant dies, dues will be transferred quarterly to Ruritan National, thus offering a perpetual memorial to the organization on behalf of the deceased Ruritan.

A "Ruritan Forever" endowment may be purchased by a member in good standing or may be purchased for a member in good standing. A Ruritan Forever endowment may be purchased to honor a non-member provided they are brought into a club as an Associate Member at the same time. In this case the Associate Member's dues would be covered by the \$600 endowment.

The lifetime endowment may also be purchased in

memory of an already deceased Ruritan, ensuring an ongoing contribution to the operation of Ruritan in his or her name. Dues for a living participant must be current through the previous quarter to participate. Ruritan National will administer these prepaid dues in a separate fund with the original amount remaining in perpetuity. Interest on the fund will provide the money paid to Ruritan National for dues.

Upon payment of the fee, the Ruritan will receive a certificate, a lapel pin, and a permanent life participant card. For endowments purchased for a deceased member a special plaque will be provided for the club to present to the deceased member's family. **National** dues increases will have no effect on participants enrolled in the plan, although the purchase price of \$600 for new enrollees may be adjusted over the years as necessary. There will be no special assessments or charges made to Ruritan Forever participants.

with other Ruritan members (spouse, kids etc.) you may not all need to get the Ruritan magazine and other mailings. One per household may be enough. If so, turn the option for publications to "no" for all but one member of the household. Then be sure and click "update." Done!

Now let's look at the right side of the member information page. There are two blue option bars (one at the top and one midway down the right side.)

At the top you can choose to see your club(s), what training you have taken, your attendance stats (provided your club secretary is using the MMS to log attendance) and your registrations for national events (conventions etc.). *NOTE: The options under "Fund" are currently still in development.

In the bottom option bar you can see what roles you have held – offices at the club, zone, district, and na-

tional levels. You may also have comments noted on your page — especially if the staff has made a change that might need to be tracked. The log shows every action you have made on the MMS — as well as actions taken that affect your membership. For example, if you have been designated as an officer — the date and time you were assigned that role will be noted. Finally, you have a projects tab on the lower options bar. If a club is using this part of the MMS — your hours spent

on a given project are listed here. From this option – new projects can be added, time can be added to existing projects, and a complete list of club projects can be added. Remember that any text with an underline is a link to more information.

NOTE: A complete list of project hours for the entire club can also be accessed using the "Club Project Hours" on the club's home page.
