Communication is Vital for our Success

Much has been said about leaving 2020 behind, but I am encouraged by the accomplishments from decisions we were forced to make. Year 2020 was unique, thanks mostly to the pandemic, but we are looking forward to the opportunities that lie ahead in 2021, a new year brings new opportunities.

I am referring to the changes that took place in 2020 from the new experience of managing our Ruritan business from teleworking, a constant cycle of Microsoft Teams, and Zoom meetings. Yet we closed 2020 having served our

communities and communicated with our clubs, districts, and national leaders with new innovative ideas. I cannot thank you enough for your generosity to your communities (health caregivers, first responders, sheriff/police, nursing homes, hospitals, and schools). You faced dangerous circumstances, trusted God, worked together, and succeeded.

Are we ready to keep it going by capitalizing on these new experiences and opportunities? I am talking about our goals and direction for 2021.

Goals / Directions for 2021

- 1. **Communication** is vital for our success. Encourage club members to maintain communication among each other, their districts, and communities by using telephone calls, teleconferencing, Microsoft Teams, Zoom, and other means of technology. It is the key to maintaining member interest/involvement when many clubs are still not meeting in person.
- 2. The safety and well-being of our members must be a priority.
- 3. Retention of our current membership is another area of grave importance. Many clubs are not meeting and therefore members may not be communicating. Work with your district and zone governors to ensure they are contacting club members. Inform club members of communication technologies (Teams/Zoom) that are available and can easily allow for communicating and sharing documents. Provide instructions if needed or direct them to the Ruritan National staff.
- 4. **Growth** Continue to monitor club growth on MMS by recognizing those that add new members. Send a personal note, email, or call them. Reach out to clubs that have a small membership and to those that need help or encouragement. Continue encouraging members to always be aware of potential new member opportunities. Many folks may have extra time on their hands because of the pandemic.
- 5. **Restructure -** The team's goal is to refine the preliminary report provided to the National Directors in 2020. The refined report will be available at the 2022 National Convention at a workshop to solicit input from delegates and Ruritan leaders. The mission of the restructuring committee was to study Ruritan data and history, provide findings and make recommendation/suggestions on how our organization can flourish in the current environment. This committee was created as a response to the request of many delegates and Ruritan leaders over the years recommending Ruritan make changes. This mission is a work in progress and is expected to take two or three years to conclude. Any changes made that require a bylaw change will require delegate approval. All Ruritans are encouraged to participate in this process by sharing your ideas. We are all in this together.

Executive Director Mike Chrisley





As a result of the cancellation of our 2021 National Convention, the Board met in December to determine the right course of action for 2021. The board determined that all National Board of Directors will serve in the same capacity in 2021 as they did in 2020, as will the National President,

National President-Elect, National Secretary, and National Treasurer. Any National Board member who is unable to continue through 2021 may submit a resignation and be replaced. The replacement will be confirmed by a vote of the entire board.

One National Director, Larry Bowman, was unable to serve another year on his term and did submit his resignation. At their January meeting the board members voted to fill his seat for the remainder of this year with Past National Director Susan Greisz.

All candidates seeking office will continue campaigning until the next National Convention in January 2022 in Myrtle Beach, South Carolina, when an election will be held.

As President Linward mentioned in his article, it is easy to look at the year of the pandemic in a negative light. Like Linward, and everyone else, I am not happy about the pandemic and its effect on our entire world, our country, or on Ruritan. But, in the grand scheme of things it did force us to do things differently and think about ways to remain relevant in a highly unusual year.

We had to learn to meet differently. Ruritan committees met mostly using Microsoft Teams. Once we figured out that we could meet that way and be highly productive in the process, we proceeded to meet. In fact, the Executive Committee has had more meetings this year than any year I am aware of in the past 40 years. This is also true of the special Restructuring Committee, Bylaws Committee and Leadership Development Committee. All three of these committees completed an enormous amount of work meeting virtually.

It was more than just meeting though. The pandemic forced us to look at technology in a whole different way. As an example, the Leadership Development Committee planned and completed 17 training and educational videos that were mailed to members on zip drives, added to the training modules in MMS, and posted on our website. After completing that, the committee continued to work to build training materials so that members could access training in their own homes, at their own pace, in their own time. I have never been prouder of a group of people or what they were able to produce as a part of committee work, almost all done virtually.

Our board met for the first time completely virtually in January.

Like everyone else, I missed the fellowship of coming together. However, we were able to complete the board meeting in just over six hours and executed 17 pieces of business. The number of motions addressed at this meeting was one of the largest in the last five years. The board was able to complete all the business on the agenda in record time at a cost saving of nearly \$10,000 in travel expenses.

The circumstances of the year have also helped our clubs do things in new ways. One member I spoke to said that one of the major fundraisers for his club is a steak supper. The supper was always held in the club building and produced a large crowd. The members of the club decided to have the supper but have it as a drive thru event. Many were worried that the club would not do well. When all was said and done the club raised more money as a drive thru than they did with the in-person event.

Finally, because of the pandemic, and the cancellation of many of our live meetings, we are exploring the possibilities of virtual conferences. Hopefully, we will soon be able to resume live meetings and conferences. However, the pandemic did make us think about those members who even in normal circumstances are not able to attend our conferences and meetings. Many may not be able to attend because of poor health or mobility. Some may not be able to attend because of the cost of the meeting. Whatever the reason, we would like to provide a virtual meeting experience for our members that cannot attend in person. We are working to make that a reality.

Many times, problem situations create just the opportunity that we need to think differently and improve on what we are doing. We try to always operate in a way that makes things better for our members and clubs.


One of the greatest opportunities that we always have is to bring new members and clubs into the Ruritan family. With clubs not meeting, it is difficult to maintain the relationships that you have with your club members and the community. Make sure that you maintain those relationships. Not meeting makes it easy to not meet. Your club is as important to the community as it has always been. Your membership is as important to your club as it has always been.

Ruritan members who participate in the Ruritan Forever program, either by making the purchase themselves or having been given the Ruritan Forever distinction, are planting trees under whose shade they will not sit. They are guaranteeing the continuation of their beloved Ruritan organization.

With every Ruritan Forever membership, the organization is assured an annual endowment equal to a year of national dues after the member passes on.

In 2021 Ruritan will be focusing on the Ruritan Forever program under the guidance of President Elect Glen Broadwater and "Second Lady" Linda Broadwater. Furthermore, action by the Ruritan National Board at their January 2021 meeting now offers an incentive for the program. Effective immediately through the Summer Leadership Conference August 14, 2021.

Anyone purchasing a Ruritan Forever for themselves or another member will receive a \$25 gift certificate to be used toward Ruritan Supplies. Orders must be made by calling the Ruritan National Office.

Download a Ruritan Forever application from the Ruritan Website or fill out the application on the next page to participate in the program or honor a fellow Ruritan with this very special gift.



What is a Ruritan Forever?

"Ruritan Forever" is a plan for the payment of <u>national</u> dues by members who wish to make a long term investment in Ruritan. The "Ruritan Forever" plan allows a member in good standing to pay \$600 and become a life-time participant of the National Organization. Ruritan National will invest these pre-payments in a special managed fund, transferring the dues quarterly to the business office of Ruritan National. Even after the life participant dies, dues will be transferred quarterly to Ruritan National, thus offering a perpetual memorial to the organization on behalf of the deceased Ruritan.

A "Ruritan Forever" endowment may be purchased by a member in good standing or may be purchased for a member in good standing. A Ruritan Forever endowment may be purchased to honor a non-member provided they are brought into a club as an Associate Member at the same time. In this case the Associate Member's dues would be covered by the \$600 endowment.

The lifetime endowment may also be purchased in memory of an already deceased Ruritan, ensuring an ongoing contribution to the operation of Ruritan in his or her name. Dues for a living participant must be current through the previous quarter to participate. Ruritan National will administer these prepaid dues in a separate fund with the original amount remaining in perpetuity. Interest on the fund will provide the money paid to Ruritan National for dues.

Upon payment of the fee, the Ruritan will receive a certificate, a lapel pin, and a permanent life participant card. For endowments purchased for a deceased member a special plaque will be provided for the club to present to the deceased member's family. **National** dues increases will have no effect on participants enrolled in the plan, although the purchase price of \$600 for new enrollees may be adjusted over the years as necessary. There will be no special assessments or charges made to Ruritan Forever participants.

was drive-thru only. The club members missed their regular eat-in customers, but today we live in a different world and had to adjust.







In 2019, the 60-member, 59-year-old White Hall Ruritan Club completed a two-year self-examination of the club's community activities. The goal of the study, named A Better Place, was to assure that club resources were being used effectively. Our first goals have been to improve our ability to communicate with club members and to link members to existing county alert systems, specifically the Code Red program. How to Reset Your MMS Password

Knowing how to reset your password for the Member Management System (MMS) is important for anyone who regularly uses the system. From time to time a user will be prompted to reset their password, just to preserve the highest level of security. A user who has forgotten his or her password may also need to reset it. 


