Ricky will share thought provoking experiences from his life through friendship, faith, and service to motivate and inspire.





The Ruritan National Board of Directors voted to increase the purchase price of a Ruritan Forever endowment from \$600 to \$800, taking effect January 1, 2023.

Download a Ruritan Forever application from the Ruritan website to participate in the program or to honor a fellow Ruritan with this very special gift. Every new 2022 Ruritan Forever receives a free polo.

What is a Ruritan Forever?

"Ruritan Forever" is a plan for the payment of <u>national</u> dues by members who wish to make a long term investment in Ruritan. The "Ruritan Forever" plan allows a member in good standing to pay \$600 and become a life-time participant of the National Organization. Ruritan National will invest these pre-payments in a special managed fund, transferring the dues quarterly to the business office of Ruritan National. Even after the life participant dies, dues will be transferred quarterly to Ruritan National, thus offering a perpetual memorial to the organization on behalf of the deceased Ruritan.

A "Ruritan Forever" endowment may be purchased by a member in good standing or may be purchased for a member in good standing. A Ruritan Forever endowment may be purchased to honor a non-member provided they are brought into a club as an Associate Member at the same time. In this case the Associate Member's dues would be covered by the \$600 endowment.

The lifetime endowment may also be purchased in memory of an already deceased Ruritan, ensuring an ongoing contribution to the operation of Ruritan in his or her name. Dues for a living participant must be current through the previous quarter to participate. Ruritan National will administer these prepaid dues in a separate fund with the original amount remaining in perpetuity. Interest on the fund will provide the money paid to Ruritan National for dues.

Upon payment of the fee, the Ruritan will receive a certificate, a lapel pin, and a permanent life participant card. For endowments purchased for a deceased member a special plaque will be provided for the club to present to the deceased member's family. **National** dues increases will have no effect on participants enrolled in the plan, although the purchase price of \$600 for new enrollees may be adjusted over the years as necessary. There will be no special assessments or charges made to Ruritan Forever participants.

2022 RURITAN NATIONAL FOUNDATION PRESIDENT O.H. BOBBITT III

As America continues to adjust to a new hybrid normal your Ruritan National Foundation trustees continue to be conscious of situations that may necessitate change. As a result of current market conditions your RNF trustees are also staying vigilant about conditions that may require a speedy response. We recently held a TEAMS meeting featuring our Investment Advisor, Scott Carr, with Wells Fargo Advisors. He continues to monitor market conditions and keeps the trustees up to date on market conditions.

Your RNF trustees were also excited to announce that, for the first time, the Build Your Dollars match will be 150%! This means that

each club who made their \$300 Build Your Dollar (BY\$) deposit by October 01, 2021, can now submit the BY\$ Claim form and will receive \$750 to be awarded as a scholarship. The deadline for the BY\$ Claim forms is June 30, 2022. The form must be postmarked by this date.

We are continuing to finalize plans for the 2022 Ruritan National Foundation Fellowship Weekend. The weekend is currently being schedule for September in Pigeon Forge, TN. More information will be sent soon in a Ruritan National Foundation Blast.

I also encourage clubs, districts, and individuals to continue to honor Ruritan members and non-Ruritans with a Tom Downing Fellowship. A Tom Downing Fellowship can be awarded with a \$500 donation to the RNF. There are also several match programs available on a limited basis which will match \$250. Please contact the RNF office for additional information.

He is also survived by his eight grandchildren, Kloyce Dennard, Nic Dennard, Coleman Wright, Jacob Wright, Aidan McGann, Kameron Dennard, Evan Dennard, Ava Dennard; and his great-granddaughter, Aralyn Dennard.



Otis was very involved in his community and started the East Hanover Rescue Squad. Otis served as a Hanover County Planning Commissioner for seven years and was on the Hanover County Electoral Board for three years. He was a member of the **Mechanicsville** Ruritan Club, Washington Henry Masonic Lodge #344 and the Richmond East Moose Lodge. Otis worked at MCV/VCU in the Biomedical Engineering facility, designing and fabricating tools and equipment for use in medical research and in the medical field. 

Ruritan staff may also send email blasts to Ruritan leaders about other offers – supply sales, donation opportunities (i.e. St. Jude's Children's Hospital) etc. You can also opt out of those email blasts by emailing service@ruritan.org.

*Note that there is a lead time on mailings and it could take 30 - 60 days to update mailing lists.

Resolving Conflicts In Your Club

First in a series

How can your club members work smoothly together, drawing strength from a variety of personalities and priorities?

When groups work together there are two separate issues involved. First is the task (the actual job being done) and second is the process (the way the group acts as a unit.) Clubs who focus solely on getting the job done and neglect the group process, may find themselves able to do less and less. These are clubs marked by frustration.

Clubs who pay attention to their process can find themselves having successes they never thought possible. These are clubs known for their spirit of cooperation and a high level of fellowship and goodwill.

While some groups must struggle with formation and structure, Runtan clubs should not be facing that problem. By constitution and design, clubs have

distinct officers with specific duties and service committees that allow for smooth organization and function.

However, once the officers are elected and the committees appointed, most clubs must face a few obstacles in the road to

performance. The group process is important. We accomplish more working on a common project than we could ever do as individuals. With a group we can combine talents, experience, and skills for the best possible outcome.

But with every group, comes a set of challenges. Consider these group characteristics and suggestions:

The Mouse: This is the quiet member in the corner who doesn't say much. He or she may be the most under-utilized person in your club. If you are the mouse – It is your responsibility to speak up and share your ideas. If your club has a mouse – try drawing him or her out, encouraging interaction in group discussion and performance.

The Loud-Mouth: Here's another character who shows up in most groups. Is there someone in your club whose opinions form a disproportionate share of the discussion. Consider for a moment if the loud-mouth could be you. If the loud-mouth is someone else, ask him or her to summanze briefly and ask others for their views.

Written Record: Consider using an easel with a flip

chart or a dry erase board so that decisions made during a meeting can be recorded boldly in front of everyone. This evoids conflict when the minutes of the meeting later reflect something not everyone realized was happening.

Feedback: Club presidents and committee chairs should ask for feedback frequently, even on small issues. Everyone offering a criticism should be prepared to offer a suggestion for improvement.

Handling Failure and Deadlock: Ultimately the longterm success of your club will depend upon how your members handle failure – because you will occasionally fail to accomplish your goals. Any failure should be explored by the group and the club should make an effort to learn from the mistakes. In the case of deadlock – two opposing groups facing off on some proposed action – try to find the common ground and ways to compromise. Most importantly, decide if the issue even needs to be settled. Many a

> club meeting has been wasted on this kind of debate, when tabling the issue might have served the group better. If the issue is not critical, try something simple, like tossing a coin, provided all parties agree to abide by the outcome.

Sign posting: On your way to a

large goal, make sure club members understand what is being done along the way – keeping the big picture in mind.

Avoid single solutions: For every problem, generate a number of atternatives for discussion, then pick one to implement.

Active Communication: This is the responsibility of both the speaker and the listener. The speaker must actively express his or her ideas in a clear, concise manner. This listener must actively seek to understand what has been said and ask for clarification if unsure

Groups are like any relationships – you have to work at them. With just a little attention to your club's group dynamics you can accomplish work far beyond anything you might imagine.
